# NORTHERN KENTUCKY HEAT AND COLD EMERGENCY PLANS

## SECTION ONE – HEAT EMERGENCY PLAN

### PURPOSE

This plan has been developed to provide structure, guidance and direction to the public safety, public health and social service agencies of Northern Kentucky when occasions of prolonged heat occur within the region. This plan delineates specific procedures for the declaration of heat alerts and heat emergencies, notifications to be made upon declaration, and actions to be taken by public safety and public health agencies.

### SCOPE

Because Northern Kentucky is part of the Cincinnati Metropolitan Region, the declaration of a “**HEAT ALERT**” or a “**HEAT EMERGENCY**” by the Cincinnati Health Commissioner will cause the same declaration in Northern Kentucky by the Northern Kentucky Health Department (NKHD).

For the purpose of this plan, Northern Kentucky will be defined as Boone, Campbell, Grant, and Kenton counties.

This plan will also be provided to Three Rivers Health District and the Emergency Management Agencies in Carroll, Gallatin, Owen and Pendleton counties.

### MONITORING

Each day during the months of June through September, the Cincinnati Health Department will use heat index and actual temperature data, both past and predicted, as well as the Kalkstein air mass model, to determine and issue two levels of warnings, “**HEAT ALERT**” and “**HEAT EMERGENCY**”.

### HEAT ALERT

The term “**HEAT ALERT**” signifies that weather-generated heat conditions are developing which would be favorable for producing adverse health conditions on the human body.

The general criteria for declaring a “**HEAT ALERT**” are:

1. Two consecutive days of heat index factor of 95° F or above, or
2. One day with a heat index factor of 105° or above, or
3. One day with a heat index factor of 95° or above in combination with the following over-night low temperature of 70° F or higher.

### HEAT EMERGENCY

The term “HEAT EMERGENCY” signifies that weather-generated heat conditions exist which could produce adverse health conditions on the human body if caution and preventative measures are not taken.

The general criteria for a “**HEAT EMERGENCY**” are:

1. Four consecutive days of a heat index factor of 95° or above, or;
2. Two days with a heat index factor of 95° or above in conjunction with the following over-night-low temperature of 70° or higher.

### DECLARATION NOTIFICATION

When the Cincinnati Health Commissioner has determined that weather conditions consistent with a Heat Alert or Heat Emergency either exist or will exist, the Commissioner will declare a “HEAT ALERT” or “HEAT EMERGENCY” for the City of Cincinnati, and will notify the NKHD of the declaration. The NKHD will then issue the same alert for the counties of Boone, Campbell, Grant and Kenton and notify the following agencies:

- Emergency Management Agencies of each county
- Transit Authority of Northern Kentucky (TANK)
- Saint Elizabeth Medical Center
- Duke Energy

The notification list is provided as Attachment A.

Upon declaration of a heat alert or heat emergency by the NKHD, Emergency Management Agencies will make the following notifications:

1. County Judge Executive and Deputy Judge Executive
2. Mayors of each City in their respective counties
3. County Public Information Officer
4. County Public Safety Communications Centers
5. County Fire/EMS Agencies
6. County Law Enforcement Agencies
7. Northern Kentucky Community Action Commission
8. Other Social Service Agencies As Per Attached Lists
9. Duke Energy, Owen County Rural Electric Cooperative, Northern Kentucky Water District

NKHD will prepare and send a press release to all media outlets. Examples of press releases are provided as Attachment B. Included in the press release will be information concerning recommended measures to minimize the ill effects of excessive heat.

In addition, the host facilities that have agreed to provide cool centers for the County (Attachment C) will be asked to open for the duration of the heat alert or emergency, 12 p.m. to 6 p.m. Monday thru Friday and 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, Sunday, and holidays. The Transit Authority of Northern Kentucky (TANK) has agreed to provide free

transportation to any person who desires transportation to any cool center. Upon termination of the heat alert or emergency, or if the person desires to leave, they will be provided with a voucher (Attachment D) to return home via TANK.

Senior Services of Northern Kentucky has agreed to transport any senior citizen, 60 years of age and older, for a heat-related medical emergency to Senior Centers (provided as Attachment E) between the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Residents in rural counties who wish to be transported to a cool center, or to a Community Action Center, should contact the Northern Kentucky Community Action Commission (sites are provided as Attachment F). The NKCAC has vans, including handicapped accessible, for that purpose.

The cool centers are located at the Greenup Haus in Covington and all eight county Community Action Centers during routine business hours and at Elohim Ministries during designated hours.

In addition to the cool centers, all of the notified agencies will be asked to be on the alert for heat related injuries among the following “at risk” populations:

1. Frail elderly or homeless persons
2. Persons with threatening types of illnesses (such as cardiovascular or kidney disease or general debilitation)
3. Persons with mental illness

These persons, once identified, should be monitored during the heat alert, and encouraged to visit cool centers for the duration of the incident.

The County Emergency Communications Centers will be notified to monitor and report any increases in heat related dispatches.

The County Fire/EMS Agencies will be notified and asked to ensure that all EMS and Rescue Units are equipped and ready to treat heat-related illnesses.

Northern Kentucky Community Action Commission and other Social Service agencies (Attachment G) will be notified and asked to activate monitoring procedures for “at-risk” persons served by their departments.

Saint Elizabeth Medical Center will be notified and asked to monitor and report numbers of heat-related emergency room visits.

Local utilities will be contacted and a request will be made that all utility disconnections are suspended for the duration of the heat emergency.

For the duration of the “Heat Alert” or “Heat Emergency”, the emergency management staff will:

1. Query the CAD system for the number of dispatches related to heat related illnesses.
2. Monitor the number of heat related emergency room visits.
3. Report these numbers to the NKHD for compilation by date and county.

### CANCELLING A HEAT ALERT OR HEAT EMERGENCY

“HEAT ALERTS” and “HEAT EMERGENCIES” will remain in effect until cancelled by the NKHD. Upon cancellation, all agencies that were in the original notification list will be notified of the cancellation.

NKHD will issue press releases canceling the declaration (Attachment H).

## SECTION TWO – COLD EMERGENCY PLAN

### PURPOSE

This plan has been developed to provide structure, guidance and direction to the public safety, public health and social service agencies of Northern Kentucky when occasions of prolonged cold weather occurs within the region. This plan provides specific procedures to follow during cold weather and the dangers associated with severe winter weather, notifications to be made upon declaration, and actions to be taken by public safety and public health agencies.

### SCOPE

For the purpose of this plan, Northern Kentucky will be defined as Boone, Campbell, Grant, and Kenton counties.

This plan will also be provided to Three Rivers Health District and the Emergency Management Agencies in Carroll, Gallatin, Owen and Pendleton counties.

### MONITORING

Historically, the cold weather season for Northern Kentucky is from November through the end of March. A review of weather data for a five-year period indicated that nightly temperatures in November were as low as 25°F and from December through March were 0°F or lower, with or without a wind chill.

### TYPES OF COLD INJURIES

Specific injuries associated with cold weather are frostnip, frostbite, and hypothermia. Warning signs and treatment are listed on the next page.

#### **Frost Nip**

Frost Nip is a mild form of frostbite that irritates the skin, causing redness and a cold feeling followed by numbness. Frost Nip DOES NOT permanently damage the skin.

<b>Warning Signs</b>	<b>Treatment</b>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Redness and / or pain of the skin in the affected area.</li><li>• Skin feels superficially firm or waxy, but still soft underneath.</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• <b>Do not rub the area!</b> This could cause damage to skin cells!</li><li>• Re-warm the area gently by blowing warm air on it or placing the area against a warm body part (armpit, stomach, etc.).</li></ul>

#### **Frost bite**

Frostbite occurs when the skin and underlying tissues actually freeze. First your skin becomes very cold and red (Frost Nip), then numb, hard and pale. Frostbite is most common on the fingers, toes, nose, ears, cheeks and chin. Exposed skin in cold, windy weather is most vulnerable to frostbite.

<b>Warning Signs</b>	<b>Treatment</b>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Numbness of the affected area.</li><li>• Skin is white or gray.</li><li>• Skin feels “<i>wooden</i>” all the way through.</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• <b>Seek medical attention immediately.</b> Controlled re-warming is best performed under medical supervision.</li><li>• Do not begin re-warming until the area is past the danger of refreezing.</li><li>• Thawing is complete when color and sensation has returned. <b>There can be significant pain once the area is re-warmed.</b></li></ul>

### Hypothermia

Hypothermia is a medical emergency that occurs when the body loses heat faster than it can produce heat, causing a dangerously low body temperature. Normal body temperature is around 98.6°F (37°C) and hypothermia occurs as the body temperature falls below 95°F (35°C).

Warning Signs	Treatment
<p><u>Mild Hypothermia</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Shivering</li> <li>• Fumbling hands</li> <li>• Hands numb</li> </ul> <p><b>Moderate Hypothermia</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Violent shivering</li> <li>• Difficulty speaking, slurred speech</li> <li>• Stumbling</li> <li>• Confusion, memory loss</li> <li>• Signs of depression, withdrawn</li> <li>• Incoherent/irrational behavior</li> </ul> <p><u>Severe Hypothermia</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Shivering stops</li> <li>• Blue or puffy skin</li> <li>• Poor muscle coordination</li> <li>• Inability to walk</li> <li>• Confusion</li> <li>• Drowsiness, exhaustion</li> <li>• Dilation of the pupils</li> <li>• Decreased respiratory rate and pulse</li> <li>• Core temperature 95oF or below</li> </ul> <p><u>For infants:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Bright red, cold skin</li> <li>• Very low energy</li> </ul>	<p><u>Mild-Moderate Hypothermia</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Replace wet clothing with dry clothing.</li> <li>• Put on additional layers of clothing.</li> <li>• Increase the person’s physical activity.</li> <li>• Give warm beverages containing sugar.</li> <li>• Use blankets to warm the person and move the victim, to a warm room, if possible.</li> <li>• Give body to body contact, if a heat source is unavailable.</li> <li>• AVOID giving: alcohol, caffeine, tobacco/nicotine</li> </ul> <p><u>Severe Hypothermia</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Call 911 immediately!</b></li> <li>• Make sure person is dry, wrap in a minimum of 4 inches of sleeping bags, wool blankets, and wool clothing.</li> <li>• Warm center of body first. Apply heat to neck, chest, and groin – use hot water bottles, warm towels, or chemical heat packs such as Heat Wave™.</li> </ul>

### DECLARATION NOTIFICATION

The Northern Kentucky Health Department (NKHD) will make the declaration to prepare for cold weather and its dangers in November for the counties of Boone, Campbell, Grant and Kenton. This declaration will stay in affect until the end of March.

Additional periodic declarations will be released dependent upon the severity of the cold weather events as they occur (Ex: blizzard conditions, extremely cold, etc.).

The NKHD will then notify the following agencies:

- Saint Elizabeth Medical Center

The notification list is provided as Attachment A.

Upon declaration by the NKHD, Emergency Management Agencies will make the following notifications:

1. County Judge Executive and Deputy Judge Executive
2. Mayors of each City in their respective counties
3. County Public Information Officer
4. County Public Safety Communications Centers
5. County Fire/EMS Agencies
6. County Law Enforcement Agencies
7. Northern Kentucky Community Action Commission
8. Other Social Service Agencies As Per Attached Lists
9. Duke Energy, Owen County Rural Electric Cooperative, Northern Kentucky Water District

### WHO IS AT RISK?

Those who are at risk include the elderly, babies sleeping in cold rooms, people with chronic illnesses, people who cannot afford to heat their homes properly, and people who remain outdoors during severe weather for extended periods of time (construction workers, the homeless, hikers, hunters, children playing in the snow).

### HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF FROM COLD WEATHER INJURIES

The simplest forms of protection are to stay dry, eat well-balanced meals, and avoid alcohol and nicotine prior to and during exposure.


Outdoor wear should consist of multiple layers of loose-fitting clothing, a hat, a scarf or knit mask to cover the face and mouth, sleeves that are snug at the wrist, water-resistant coat, mittens or gloves (mittens are warmer than gloves), and water-resistant shoes or boots.

Indoor precautions include wearing multiple layers of loose-fitting clothing, sleeping in warm clothing (use blankets), and if you are 65 years of age and older, place an easy-to-read thermometer in an indoor location where you will see it often. Your ability to feel a change in temperature decreases with age.

### HEAT ALERT

In cooperation with the Southwestern Ohio regional heat alert plan, the Northern Kentucky Independent District Health Department is extending the heat alert for \_\_\_\_\_, declared by the City of Cincinnati, to apply to the four northernmost counties of Northern Kentucky: Boone, Campbell, Grant, and Kenton. A heat alert indicates that, due to the current or predicted weather conditions, vulnerable individuals may be at risk for heat-related illness.

Individuals who are most at risk include the elderly, the homeless, and persons whose chronic illnesses decrease their ability to respond to heat stresses (heart and kidney disease, high blood pressure, recent stroke, diarrhea, mental illness). Alcohol and certain medications (antidepressants, diuretics, antihistamines, and more) increase risk for heat-related illness as well. Persons employed outdoors, such as construction workers and roofers, make up another group at risk for heat stress. Infants and small children are also at greater risk.

During a heat alert, citizens of Northern Kentucky are advised to take precautions to avoid heat stress and heat illness:

- Drink plenty of fluids, even if not thirsty.
- Avoid alcoholic and caffeinated beverages.
- Decrease physical activity.
- Eat lightly.
- Dress in light-colored, lightweight, loose, cotton clothing.
- Make use of baths and showers to cool down.
- Close blinds or shades to keep the sunlight and heat out of your home.
- Spend time in air-conditioned areas or in a cooler basement.
- Take advantage of public areas that are air-conditioned, such as malls, libraries, and movie theaters.
- Do not leave children or pets unattended in closed vehicles.
- Remember----fans only work when they are bringing cool air from a cooler space into a warmer area. Fans blowing hot air directly onto your body can increase heat stress and hasten dehydration.

During the heat alert, a cool center will be open (12 Noon to 6:00 pm weekdays and 11:00 to 4:00 on weekends and holidays) for the use of those who need a cool place to wait out the hot hours of the day: **Greenup Haus at 1122 Greenup in Covington**. TANK buses will transport individuals to the cool center upon request. At the cool center, a voucher will be given for the TANK rides back home.

If you live in the rural areas of our counties, Community Action Commission (CAC) vans are available to transport you to the Covington cool center or to a Community Action Center. The CAC transportation number is 581-6607 (ext 121) or toll-free, 1-800-783-6607 (ext 121).

All senior centers will function as cool centers for senior citizens (age 60 and over) between the hours of 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. during the heat alert. Senior Services of Northern Kentucky will provide transportation for medical emergencies, just call 292-7945.

If you have neighbors, friends or loved ones who fall into a high-risk group for heat-related illness, visit or call to see how they are doing. Make sure they are aware of the heat alert and know what precautions to take. Invite them to visit an air-conditioned location with you. Your concern and a moment of your time may save a life.

### HEAT EMERGENCY

In cooperation with the Southwestern Ohio regional heat alert plan, the Northern Kentucky Independent District Health Department is extending the heat emergency for \_\_\_\_\_, declared by the City of Cincinnati, to apply to the Northern Kentucky counties of Boone, Campbell, Grant, and Kenton. A heat emergency indicates that, due to the current and/or predicted weather conditions, persons in our community are at risk for heat-related illness.

Individuals who are most at risk include the elderly, the homeless, and persons whose chronic illnesses decrease their ability to respond to heat stresses (heart and kidney disease, high blood pressure, recent stroke, diarrhea, mental illness). Alcohol and certain medications (antidepressants, diuretics, antihistamines, and more) increase risk for heat-related illness as well. Persons employed outdoors, such as construction workers and roofers, make up another group at risk for heat stress. Infants and small children are also at greater risk.

During a heat emergency, citizens of Northern Kentucky are advised to take precautions to avoid heat stress and heat illness:

TANK buses will transport individuals to the cool centers upon request. At the cool centers, a voucher will be given for the TANK rides back home.

If you live in the rural areas of our counties, Community Action Commission (CAC) vans are available to transport you to the Covington cool center or to a Community Action Center. The CAC transportation number is 581-6607 (ext 121) or toll-free, 1-800-783-6607 (ext 121).

All senior centers will function as cool centers for senior citizens (age 60 and over) between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. during the heat emergency. Senior Services of Northern Kentucky will provide transportation for medical emergencies, just call (859) 292-7945.

If you have neighbors, friends or loved ones who fall into a high-risk group for heat-related illness, visit or call to see how they are doing. Make sure they are aware of the heat emergency and know what precautions to take. Invite them to visit an air-conditioned location with you. Your concern and a moment of your time may save a life.

## Cold Weather Emergency Declaration

The cold weather season for Northern Kentucky is traditionally from November to March, where low temperatures can range from -5°F to + 22°F and wind speeds can average 22 miles per hour. This declaration is being issued to indicate that conditions for cold weather emergencies and cold weather-related injuries are present.

Those who are at risk include the elderly, babies sleeping in cold rooms, people with chronic illnesses, people who cannot afford to heat their homes properly, and people who remain outdoors during severe weather for extended periods of time – construction workers, the homeless, hikers, hunters, children playing in the snow.

The simplest methods of protection are to stay dry, eat well-balanced meals, and avoid alcohol and nicotine prior to and during exposure.

Outdoor wear should consist of multiple layers of loose-fitting clothing, a hat, a scarf or knit mask to cover the face and mouth, sleeves that are snug at the wrist, water-resistant coat, mittens or gloves (mittens are warmer than gloves), and water-resistant shoes or boots.

Indoor precautions include: wearing multiple layers of loose-fitting clothing, sleep in warm clothing (use blankets), and if you are 65 years of age and older, place an easy-to-read thermometer in an indoor location where you will see it often. Your ability to feel a change in temperature decreases with age.



The heat alert/emergency, declared by the City of Cincinnati and extended to Campbell, Kenton, Boone, and Grant counties by the Northern Kentucky Health Department, has been cancelled effective \_\_\_\_\_. Weather conditions have improved, reducing risk of heat-related illness. Cool centers and special cool center transportation will no longer be in operation until the next heat alert or emergency is declared. Though the risk is less, vulnerable individuals and those who engage in vigorous activity out of doors, should still take reasonable precautions to avoid heat-related illness. These precautions include increasing fluids, avoiding the hottest hours for vigorous outdoor activity, and paying attention to the body's distress signals---fatigue, weakness, dizziness, clumsiness, and thirst.
